 - Due to a continued focus on the importance of Early Childhood, job growth is projected at 10% from 2016 to 2026, higher than the national average for all occupations, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.[2]
 - Illinois has been steadily increasing Early Childhood investments across the state for years and the current administration has demonstrated a strong focus on Early Childhood.
- Skills gained in preparing for a career in Early Childhood transfer with you. Qualified Early Childhood professionals are timeless and in high demand. Open positions can be found throughout the state...where you are or where you want to be.

- Programs such as Head Start offer financial help with the cost of college courses and degrees.
- Community colleges and universities across the state offer courses that build towards Early Childhood degrees, Gateways credentials and Professional Educator Licenses.
